

1.1 Sheep Or Wolf?


Instructions:

1.2 Counting Sheep


Instructions:

2.1 You are Lou!

Instructions:

Create your very own wolf in sheep's clothing in this arts and crafts activity.

What students will learn:

Encourage creativity and imagination, relating to the character in the story.



How to:

To begin this project, simply prepare a piece of blank paper, pencil, liquid glue and coloured cotton puffs.

First, draw the shape of a fox on the paper. Next, use liquid glue to stick the coloured cotton puffs on the body of the fox. Finally, fill the fox's body with the puffs until there's no more space.








2.2 Baaaaaa...!

2.3 Sheep Mask

Instructions:

Get ready your materials and follow the pictorial instructions.

What students will learn:

A fun arts and crafts for students to recreate their own version of being a wolf in sheep's clothing... in this case, mask!



Materials Needed:

- 1. Cardboard ring
- 4. Glue
- 2. White or black paper
- 3. Pencil



How to:




First, prepare all your materials.



Next, use a glue stick to apply some glue on the gripped flat end of the paper.



Next, cut the paper into small rectangular strips of about 10cm each. Grip one end of the paper and slide the pencil from the gripped end to the outer end until the paper curls!



Stick the paper on top of the cardboard. Fill the empty spaces with the curled paper. Finally, you have your very own sheep mask!





3.1 Sheep Idioms

Instructions:

Find out the meaning for each sheep related idiom and create a sentence.

What students will learn:

Gathering information about different idioms related to sheep and expanding students' English vocabulary.

Answers:

1. Count sheep

Meaning: A repetitive and monotonous exercise to eventually fall asleep.

Sentence: I couldn't sleep so I decided to count sheep until I slept off.

2. A wolf in sheep's clothing

Meaning: A person who appears harmless but is actually bad.

Sentence: That young man seemed very nice but little did everyone know, he was a wolf in sheep's clothing who cheated others of their money.

3. Black sheep

Meaning: Someone who doesn't fit in with other members of the family, group or organisation.

Sentence: Adam was the black sheep because everyone in his family had red hair except for him.

4. Cast a sheep's eye

Meaning: To give a sideway glance or a suspicious look.

Sentence: Lify cost a sheep's eye at me when I complimented her outfit, but I really did think that she looked nice!

3.2 The Wolf's Shenanigans

Instructions:

Divide students into smaller groups and discuss these questions based on the story.

What students will learn:

Promote critical thinking and reinforced learning in students.

Q1.

Why did the wolf want to go near the sheep?

Suggested answer: To eat the sheep for his lamb meal!

Q2.

Like the wolf in disguise, why do we feel the need to disguise ourselves whenever we do something wrong?

Suggested answers: Feeling guilty about what we've done, feeling shy about it, not wanting people to find out.

Q3.

What is an alternative to trying to disguise yourself?

Suggested answers: Asking adults or people first before taking action, being honest.

3.3 How Do I Eat?

Instructions:

What does it mean to be carnivores, omnivores and herbivores? Give the meaning of these terms and draw the character in the story that belongs to each category.

What students will learn:

Defining scientific terms (carnivore, omnivore and herbivore) and identifying the animals in each category.

Answers:

Carnivore	Meaning of the word	Draw a character
