



1.1 Animals in the Barn


Instructions:

1.2 How Giant is GIANT?


Instructions:

1.3 Pull Out the Alphabet!


Instructions:

2.1 My Little Cottage

What students will learn:

2.2 Beanie Turnip!

Instructions:

Use a variety of beans to create a turnip mosaic art.

What students will learn:

A great addition to nature studies exposing students to different types and feel of beans.



Materials Needed:

- 1. Different types and colours of beans
- 3. Glue

2. Marker pens

5. Paper

How to:



First, prepare all your materials.



Draw an outline of a turnip using a marker pen.



Next, apply glue within your turnip drawing.



Lastly, use the different types of beans you have by pasting them within the outline to create a colourful turnip!







2.3 Count the Animals!


Instructions:

Count how many animals are pulling out the turnip and state the correct answer.

What students will learn:

Develops an understanding of numbers and addition.

3.1 Grow Your Own

Instructions:

Grow your own seed following the instructions below.

What students will learn:

Learning sustainability and how nature works, through the process of seed germination.



Materials Needed:

beans, clean cup, cotton pads, water.

How to:

To begin, prepare your materials. Soak the beans on a damp cotton on the bottom of the cup. Next, set your cup beside the window where it will get plenty of light. Lastly, sprinkle only a little bit of water on it everyday.

After 10 days, your bean should have grown into a little plant. Transfer it into a pot so that it can keep growing!









3.2 It's Raining!

Instructions:

Explain the role of rain in the book. What are the other roles of rain on our Earth? Ask them to write it down.

What students will learn:

To think outside the box and have a curious spark about things around them.



Suggested answers: For agriculture - farming, water source to all living things, fill up lakes and stream, water plants and trees, hydropower energy...

These are the materials needed for this activity: sticky notes, whiteboard and marker pens.











3.3 Turnip Talks

Instructions:

Ask students the questions below. You can choose to ask and talk about either question (i) or (ii), or you can also ask both questions.

What students will learn:

An exposure to the different root plants of the world, as well as questions that would encourage critical thinking.

Q1.

Other than turnips, what other root vegetables are there in the world? Teach them the root vegetables of the world. (You can source for some these vegetables in the local market so students can touch and feel for themselves)

Suggested Answers: Carrot, sweet potato, radish, celery, asparagus, beets, onions, garlic, and daikon...

Q2.

Discuss about how working together can make a difficult task so much easier. Ask students if they have ever helped someone, or if someone has ever helped them and what the experience was like.

They can discuss in small groups or write their thoughts down.






